

#### **Pilgrim Pathways**

With 6 weeks of content, **Pilgrim Pathways** will take pupils on a pilgrimage journey through Lent, looking at 6 different items that are important on a walking pilgrimage. Each week will focus on a different item beginning with a lamp and followed with a map, first aid kit, walking stick, shelter and finally food & drink. **Pilgrim Pathways** will help pupils explore how these items symbolise ideas that can help them when facing challenges in their personal life journey. They are designed to encourage reflection and practical actions that can support pupils' wellbeing and happiness.

Each week, the resource includes:

- An introduction to the pilgrimage symbol
- Bible links
- A short video reflection
- 4 practical challenges
- A closing prayer

The resource can be used for collective worship in school or church settings. Activities and challenges are suitable for KS2 and KS3 but can be adjusted for use with KS1 and KS4 pupils.



Kindly shared by the Diocese of Guildford:

Guildford are introducing an online **Calendar of Kindness** for use during the season of Lent. Because Lent starts on the Wednesday during half term. Each day there is:

- An image relating to the theme
- A Bible passage if you prefer to read the story
- A video of the Bible story
- Some wondering questions
- An act of kindness to do that day.
- We know that many schools used the online Advent calendar as the basis for collective worship each day, this may save quite a bit of work planning collective worships for the whole half term.

Traditionally, calendars are only for Advent, but we are introducing a Calendar of Kindness for use during the season of Lent. Because Lent starts on the Wednesday during half term, we have started this calendar from the first day back after half term with the story of Jesus in the desert. For the rest of the term, the calendar links with the themes of the collective worship series 'Kingdom Values' that we are currently offering as a resource to schools, but could

equally be used as a 'standalone' resource. Opening the calendar on a Monday will be included as part of the collective worship script, apart from St. Patrick's Day, which is on a Wednesday. As far as possible, the calendar elements link with the theme for that week, and also cover some of the events of Jesus' ministry & life over the 3 years between Jesus' temptation and his Resurrection. The following pages set out the content and act of kindness for each day so that you know what is coming up.

The calendar will go live at 00:01 on February 22<sup>nd</sup> and each door will only open on the correct day.

the Bible reference for the day;

a video link. If there is no video, then there will be a set of PowerPoint slides linked within the final section (only YouTube can be

some thoughts for you to ponder and a prompt for an act of kindness (in bold).

Each day, you could also consider the following questions: How was Jesus an 'agent of change' here? How did other people view Jesus' actions? How do you think people reacted to hearing Jesus' words? Why might Jesus have said / done this....? What does this story mean for me?

The calendar structure dictates how the elements are presented, but it will help if you view the visual materials or read the story before you ponder the questions. We do hope that you find this resource useful! Jane Whittington & Rachel Boxer



#### Easter and Lent Outside

From Sun Hats & Wellie Boots: Dotty the Donkey is back with a brand new outdoor trail for Easter! Following the same format as Dotty's Christmas adventure, this interactive trail takes children through the key events of Holy Week with a range of engaging activities to explore. Designed for use in churchyards & other outdoor spaces, this trail needs no prep or extra materials, it can simply be printed out & used straight.

In Search of Easteris a trail-based treasure hunt for children and families, using a series of videos and activities to encourage conversation and help crack a code. Clue posters offer activities and QR codes for accessing videos, as the groups explore the local area. It is a fun activity to help children and their families explore the Easter story and consider who Jesus really is.

This is a lovely Easter Scavenger hunt to be set up at home to show children parts of the Easter story and remind them that Jesus' love never ends. Encourage families to use this hunt on Easter morning and share photos of the hunt in action on social media.







# Why pray?

Prayer is an important way to experience God as the religious believer can communicate with Him. By bringing their problems to God, or asking for forgiveness and help, they come closer to Him. Christians believe they can speak with God in prayer and are taught to pray by Jesus himself.

The Church of England says praying regularly will help us to develop a spiritual rhythm. A discipline of prayer changes the way that we think about our lives, because it creates new habits of heart and mind. Prayer opens us more deeply to the transforming grace of God. We enter into God's presence, allowing the Holy Spirit to pray in us.

There are five essential aspects of prayer: confession, petition, intercession, thanksgiving and praise, in this resource booklet we have categorised them into prayers for saying:

- Thank you.
- · Sorry.
- I need help.
- · I believe.

John Calvin was a famous French theologian and he stated there are four Rules of Prayer

- The first rule is a heartfelt sense of reverence.
- The second rule is a heartfelt sense of need and repentance.
- The third rule is a heartfelt sense of humility and trust in God.
- The final rule is to have a heartfelt sense of confident hope.

The Christian value and concept of Hope is an underpinning driver of all prayer. The Christian hope is hope in God in Jesus Christ. It is the confident affirmation that God is faithful, that He will complete what He has begun. It is also, therefore, that confident expectation which waits patiently and ardently for God's purposes to be fulfilled. Through regular prayer we can find space in the busy day to contemplate and reflect on this.

# How can we pray in different ways?

The Church of England<sup>1</sup> guidance on praying is as follows:

#### Learning to pray

To pray is to make our hearts ready to experience the love of God in Jesus Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit. Praying regularly will help us to develop a spiritual rhythm. A discipline of prayer changes the way that we think about our lives, because it creates new habits of heart and mind. Prayer opens us more deeply to the transforming grace of God. We enter into God's presence, allowing the Holy Spirit to pray in us.

Services like Morning and Evening Prayer, Prayer during the Day, and Night Prayer are designed so that they can be said by individuals or in a group. These services and guidance for using them can be found here.

But we may often wish to pray by ourselves as we try to share in Christ's prayer to his Father. Whether you are a child, young person or an adult, prayer is easier than you might imagine! Millions of people of every age pray every day.

Remember that God hears every prayer—but not all prayers are answered in the way we might expect or desire: we don't always pray for his will to be done! Prayer is a discipline - it can be difficult at times, just like keeping fit, being on a diet, or keeping weeds down in the garden. Little and often is best, but don't give up! No prayer, however inadequate you may feel it to be, is ever wasted or of no value.

#### Use your hand as a model:

Your fingers can be used to bring to mind different things to pray for.



#### Thumb

This is the strongest digit on your hand. Give thanks for all the strong things in your life, like home and family, relationships that support and sustain you.

#### Index finger

This is the pointing finger. Pray for all those people and things in your life who guide and help you. Friends, teachers, doctors, nurses, emergency services and so on.

#### Middle finger

This is the tallest finger. Pray for all the important people who have power in the world, like world leaders and their governments, members of parliament and local councillors, the Royal Family, other world leaders and their governments.

#### Ring finger

This is the weakest finger on your hand. It can't do much by itself. Remember the poor, the weak, the helpless, the hungry, the sick, the ill and the bereaved.

#### Little finger

This is the smallest and the last finger on your hand. Pray for yourself.

#### The seven ways to pray:2

#### 1. Praying with the Bible

There are different ways to use your Bible in your prayer time. You can personalize Scripture by putting your own name into a verse. For example, "Amy, my peace I leave with you ... Amy, do not let your heart be troubled." (John 14:27) Try writing out a prayer from the Bible, adapting it into your own words. Or write the words of Scripture into a poem, just using the key words.

#### 2. Praying through the Bible

Lectio divina is Latin for sacred reading. The practice of going repeatedly through a short section of Scripture has been used for more than a thousand years. There are 4 steps—reading, meditating, praying, and contemplating. Each time you go through the Bible passage, take time to pause, notice, and interact with the Holy Spirit.

#### 3. Practising the Presence of God

Practising the presence of God can be done anywhere and at any time. It's simply calling to mind that God dwells within us through His Spirit and His Son. Being aware of God in our daily lives takes being intentional. Welcome Jesus into whatever you are doing. You might want to set a timer at various intervals to remind yourself to call to mind the presence of Jesus.

#### 4. Hearing God

Our Bibles burst with God speaking to His children, from Genesis to Revelation. One well-loved example of God's communication with young Samuel in <u>1 Samuel 3</u>. Samuel needed help from Eli, at first, to understand God. As we practice listening prayer, we can test what we hear from God with three helps: Scripture, impressions of the Holy Spirit, and circumstances.

#### At home...

If we want prayer to be a familiar part of a child's daily life, a tool to good mental health and wellbeing, then we need to think of fun and creative ways to develop prayer.

#### 🕸 24-7 PRAYER

24-7 Prayer <sup>5</sup>provides some useful ideas, starting by stating four key points to prayer with children – 1. Get into a rhythm of praying, 2. Get creative in how you pray, 3. Get active in what you do and 4. Get outdoors to pray.

#### 1. Get into a rhythm

Repetition is a great tool to help kids engage with spirituality. Adding meaningful habits into your daily, weekly, and yearly routine builds the muscle of prayer and incorporates into your daily life. Here are a few ideas for doing that:



Weekly 'Thank You' Jar

You could create a weekly rhythm where each member of your family writes down one thing they want to say 'thank you' for on a scrap of paper and puts it in the 'Thank you' Jar. Every few months – or at the end of the year – turn the jar over and spend some time going through all the 'thank you' s. You'll find that this activity jogs your memories of all kinds of fun memories and blessings from the past year!

#### 4. Get outdoors

The natural world has always been an amazing way to connect with God!

#### Lolly sticks blessings

Gather lolly sticks and use markers to write a word or draw a picture on the stick, and then together decide where you're going to 'plant' it. For example, you might decide to plant the word 'joy' in your neighbour's garden, or 'friendship' in the grass near school.



#### Prayer walking

The next time you go for a walk, encourage your kids to notice what's around them. What catches their attention, and what might God be saying through it?

You can also use walking as a way to pray for your community, encouraging your kids to pray for the places you pass and the people who live and work around you.

# Prayers for saying ... Thank you.

Collective worship begins with "The Lord is here" (spoken by the adult lead), and the school replies back "His spirit is with us".

It ends with The Holy Trinity. Three children are selected and they remind us:

"We think of God the Father when we open the Bible and study his words."

"We think of Jesus the Son of God when we look at the cross."

"We think of the Holy Spirit when we light the candle".

"In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, peace be with you".

And the school replies "And also with you".



# Praying in different places and contexts.

#### **Prayer Walks**



God for Kids<sup>6</sup> has some excellent resources for undertaking Prayer Walking with Kids. A practical way to be energised and feel connected to God at the same time! Prayer walking itself is not hard. You walk, you pray (either in your head or out loud). The hardest bit is getting out the front door. Visual, tangible items are so helpful for children and can be used as prayer-prompts on your walk. Here are three ideas from a much longer list of activities you could try:

- when you see a post-box, pray for those awaiting news.
- when you see a grit-bin/sandbox, pray for the road workers' well-being, safe travel or good weather conditions.
- if you have a Mr. Men or Little Miss book you could photocopy the back page and pray a blessing for as many different kinds of people you see on the way: someone happy, strong, tiny, tall, rushing, messy, grumpy, bumpy, contrary, chatterbox, twins or with long spaghetti arms!



# Prayers you might use at home.

As we know prayer can happen anywhere, anytime and with anyone. You just have to free your mind and speak to God. Below are some simple prayers children might use at home. These are also found in the appendices as a printable sheet to send home.

# Don't forget - we need to listen to God...

When children take part in prayer, they should understand that they are inviting God to speak to them too. As children pray, they are asking God to help their hearts be quiet enough to listen. Helping children to get into a comfortable listening position is an important preparatory step in them getting ready to pray. You may also help remind them of listening to God by starting their prayer by saying. "Dear God, please help me to listen to you today. Help my heart and mind to be quiet so I can hear you."
